# Producer's Note

What you are about to see and hear is your own story. Our story. Who is Church and does it matter? My hope is that you will be surprised, you will relate, you will wonder, you will laugh, cry, lament and rejoice. You may be offended or shocked. What I hope the church sees in this production is itself, and learns a bit about how to do that or be that better.

What you are about to see is thought provoking. What matters is not what you think, it is that you think. Is there an 'agenda'? Is there a specific message that the audience is 'supposed' to take away? No. The show, hopefully, invites us to enter more deeply who we are and what we're doing here anyway.

What you are about to see is youth ministry. Jenny: That was less than a month ago! At the beginning of May, none of us had met each other, not a word of our play had been written, we had no idea what was going to happen. And here we are, at the start of bringing this story, these stories, all across Canada.

# "Tolle Lege" (Take up and Read)

St. Augustine (354-430) was one of the great figures of the early Church, and a source of inspiration for one of the scenes in *Roots Among the Rocks*. The story of his conversion to Christ is told in his Confessions, in which he describes how God used a single verse from the epistle to the Romans to suddenly convert him. He went on to serve the Church as an illustrious teacher and bishop in the African city of Hippo.

"But when a profound reflection had, from the secret depths of my soul, drawn together and heaped up all my misery before the sight of my heart, there arose a mighty storm, accompanied by as mighty a shower of tears. ... I flung myself down, how, I know not, under a certain fig-tree, giving free course to my tears, and the streams of mine eyes gushed out, an acceptable sacrifice unto Thee. And, not indeed in these words, yet to this effect, spake I much unto Thee, - "But Thou, O Lord, how long?" How long, Lord? Wilt Thou be angry for ever? Oh, remember not against us former iniquities;" for I felt that I was enthralled by them. I sent up these sorrowful cries, - "How long, how long? Tomorrow, and tomorrow? Why not now? Why is there not this hour an end to my uncleanness?" I was saying these things and weeping in the most bitter contrition of my heart, when, lo, I heard the voice as of a boy or girl, I know not which, coming from a neighbouring house, chanting, and oft repeating, "Take up and read; take up and read." Immediately my countenance was changed, and I began most earnestly to consider whether it was usual for children in any kind of game to sing such words; nor could I remember ever to have heard the like. So, restraining the torrent of my tears, I rose up, interpreting it no other way than as a command to me from Heaven to open the book, and to read the first chapter I should light upon... I grasped, opened, and in silence read that paragraph on which my eyes first fell, - "Not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying; but put ve on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof." No further would I read, nor did I need; for instantly, as the sentence ended, - by a light, as it were, of security infused into my heart - all the gloom of doubt vanished away."
